<u>Game Changers Of Analy: Abigail Silvestrich</u> By: Hana Freedenburg

For Abigail Silvestrich, sports have always been more than just a pastime, they're a way of life. As a senior at Analy High School, Abigail has excelled in multiple sports, breaking barriers and setting examples along the way. From being a varsity flag football captain to being the only girl on the baseball team, her journey is one of perseverance, leadership, and love for the game.

Abigail's athletic story began when she was just four years old when her parents signed her up for tee-ball after noticing her natural athletic abilities. Though reluctant at first, once her dad said he would be her coach, she agreed to try it out for one year. She quickly fell in love with baseball, a sport she never abandoned, even in the face of discrimination. "I'm proud to say that I never switched to softball after multiple years of discrimination because I was the only girl on the team," Abigail shared. She went on to play basketball from sixth grade through her junior year of high school. When her friends encouraged her to join the school's flag football team in her junior year, she didn't hesitate. "I grew up always playing sports with my brothers, and it's weird for me when I'm not being active in some sort of way," she said.

Her proudest achievement in baseball came when she was selected to attend the prestigious MLB Develops Girls Breakthrough Series at the Jackie Robinson Training Complex in Vero Beach, Florida. The journey began with MLB GRIT, a nationwide event designed to showcase skills in hitting, throwing, and running. Abigail attended her session in San Francisco, where she had the opportunity to demonstrate her alongside other talented athletes. From there, she was selected to participate in the Elite Development Invitational (EDI) in Florida, which brought together around 90 girls, including both baseball and softball players. "It was super fun because I got to meet so many new amazing people," Abigail recalled. The camp not only provided high-level coaching but also fostered a strong sense of community among the players.

This Chestnut-backed Chickadee was very curious and allowed me to get quite close before flying off. Their bright orange, brown, and white colored feathers are a beautiful splash of contrast against the greens of tree foliage.

A flutter of wings. A flash of gold and gray among the bushes. You strain your eyes, peering through the dense foliage of the coffeeberry bush. Then, you see it, perched on a branch not far from you. You stare at it. And the Golden-Crowned Sparrow stares back.

About 2 weeks ago, our latest dance show Out of this World took place in the Analy theater. This performance featured many of our talented dancers from the Intro to Dance and Dance 3 classes. Out of this World, however, took a unique approach towards challenging the expectation of a 'typical' dance performance by using remarkable technique and music that wouldn't be in your usual dance show. It also encouraged dancers to step out of their comfort zone as well. Lots of hard work was put into this show with many months of preparation. But what exactly is happening during this long period of time? As someone in the show, I can walk you through the incredible process that made this happen. Shoutout to our amazing dance coordinator, Jolene Johnson!

Our dance students first start off by rehearsing their dances in class about a month before the show. My intro class began these rehearsals right after winter break - which showed me just how soon this performance would be. Time does go by fast! Both of the dance classes also had other skilled choreographers come in and share their ideas and knowledge of movement to the dancers. Aside from just choreographing, dancers also needed to consider other factors that contribute to creating a phenomenal show such as how they would stage it, lighting, costumes, and a catchy title for their piece. These things are important for almost if not every dance performance because they enhance the work and they serve the choreographic idea.

2 weeks before the actual show our dancers now go into tech rehearsals - the time to rehearse on the real stage, which in this case was in the Analy theater. During tech rehearsals we met with Kyle Sheridan, our local lighting designer and an El Molino alumni. He tested the music and lights to make sure it's ready to go on the day of the show. The dancers then practice how to get on and off the stage, space their dancing, practice their bow, as well as fixing their costumes. It's helpful and beneficial for dancers to practice on stage prior to the shower after having rehearsals mostly in the dance room. After these tech rehearsals are over we start the show and perform in front of an audience.

Turkey Vultures, although perhaps not quite as majestic as other birds such as hawks, are still amazing birds to watch. They are also a vital part of the ecosystem, helping to break down matter.



This Golden-crowned Sparrow has perched on a small branch, waiting for me to fill the bird feeder. Golden-Crowned Sparrows are one of the most common and easiest to spot birds, given their bright gold colored crown on their head.



This Chestnut-backed Chickadee poses for a photo. I find these birds to be some of the most stunning that you can find snacking on some bird

seed.

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This Scrub Jay is enjoying a peanut snack from high up in a tree. If you set out peanuts in your yard, you may see these birds swoop down, grab a peanut, and quickly soar away to a higher vantage point.



This White-crowned Sparrow has perched upon a fence post. I have found that White-crowned Sparrows are slightly less common than their golden-crowned cousins, which makes them more of a treat to see.



This Oak Titmouse is also curious and has taken a perch to assess any dangers. These birds may be one of my favorites, as they are quite skittish and often fly away before you can see them, which makes them more of a treat to find. Observe them for long enough, and you may notice that they like to swoop up to a feeder, grab a seed, look both ways, and dart away in a flash.


A Message From The Best Buddies Club:

"This flag football team was especially important to me because I convinced all of my friends to play, and we just had fun every practice and game," she said. One of her favorite memories from the flag football season was their opening game against Cardinal Newman. "It was really amazing because we did really well as a team, and no one really did anything wrong," Abigail shared. This victory set the tone for the long season ahead.

Through all of her accomplishments, Abigail remains grounded and passionate about inspiring others. A new era of women's basketball is here, and it's called Unrivaled. Fresh off a historic year for women's sports, the WNBA is expanding, college basketball is breaking viewership records, and now, Unrivaled is proving there's even more room for the game to grow. If you haven't been tuning in, now is the time to start. The brand-new 3-on-3 women's basketball league co-founded by WNBA stars Napheesa Collier and Breanna Stewart is redefining the offseason by keeping the league's top talent competing in the U.S. while offering higher pay, player equity, and a first-of-its-kind, athlete-driven structure.

The league is based in Miami, Florida, and features six teams competing in a fast-paced format designed to showcase elite talent in a high-energy setting. Unrivaled prioritizes player ownership, with every athlete in the league's debut season holding a stake in its success. The teams: the Laces, Lunar Owls, Mist, Phantom, Rose, and Vinyl are stacked with WNBA stars and top-tier talent, making every game highly competitive. The games are played in the 850-seat Wayfair Arena, designed to emphasize player personalities and provide an exclusive feel. The custom-built facility includes childcare services with vetted nannies, a



nursery and nursing rooms, state-of-the-art weight and recovery rooms, and dedicated locker rooms for each of the teams. Players also get to embrace their full identities as athletes and women, with on-site hair and makeup studios for interviews and games, plus the Sephora runway tunnel where they can show off their style before tipoff.

What sets Unrivaled apart even more is that it's one of the highest-paid women's sports leagues in the world. Player salaries start at \$100,000 for the ten-week season and the majority of contracts reach over \$200,000. Each of the 36 players also split 15% of the revenue and compete in a 1 on 1 tournament for a \$250,000 grand prize. The WNBA has been criticized for years as it can't pay its players enough compared to NBA salaries. The average salary for a WNBA player is \$150,000 per season, while the average NBA salary is \$10 million. The league ensures that athletes are fairly compensated without having to go overseas to supplement their income.

Unrivaled has signed UConn's Paige Bueckers and LSU's Flau'jae Johnson to NIL marketing deals as part of its 'The Future is Unrivaled' campaign, a brand platform designed to empower the next generation of women's basketball stars on and off the court. While they won't play in Unrivaled until they're out of college, these groundbreaking NIL deals show the investment toward female athletes and the league's future. On top of major sponsorship deals, Unrivaled has racked up \$28 million from investors including Michael Phelps, Giannis Antetokounmpo, Dawn Staley, JuJu Watkins, Coco Gauff, Alex Morgan, and more. The financial investment in Unrivaled marks a major step forward for female athletes.

The fast-paced, compressed full-court format makes every game exciting, and the star power is undeniable. Players like Jewell Lloyd, Brittany Griner, and Arike Ogunbowale are lighting up the court in ways that showcase just how skilled and competitive women's basketball is. Two of the many WNBA players competing in Unrivaled are Kate Martin and Tiffany Hayes who play for the Laces. They will take what they've gained from Unrivaled back to the WNBA, where they're both set to play for the Golden State Valkyries in the team's inaugural season. The league will hold its draft in April before the Valkyries tip off their debut season on May 16 against the LA Sparks, and we finally have a team to root for right here at home. In Norse mythology, Valkyries are

essentially a group of fierce female warriors, a perfect counterpart to the Bay's legendary NBA team, the Golden State Warriors. They symbolize strength and resilience, qualities that define both the team and the area they represent. While they'll play in San Francisco's Chase Center, where the Warriors play, their front office is based in Oakland, reinforcing their roots across the Bay Area. Women's basketball is growing fast with new teams coming to Toronto and Portland in 2026. Cities like Detroit, Nashville, Kansas City, and many more have also submitted bids for future expansion. If you're a sports fan, this is just the beginning of something great. But for now, all eyes should be on Unrivaled.

The inaugural season of Unrivaled will be delivering top-tier competition through March 17. The games can be streamed on TNT, TruTv, and Max every Friday, Saturday, and Monday. <u>Trump's First Days And Sweeping Executive</u> Orders

On January 20th, as Donald Trump was sworn in as the 47th President of the United States, he issued a large amount of executive orders. These orders target immigration, climate policy, social issues, and foreign relations. One of the most significant areas of focus for the new orders is illegal immigration. President Trump declared a national emergency at the southern border

over illegal immigration. He reinstated the "Remain in Mexico" policy, requiring asylum seekers to stay in Mexico while their applications for asylum were processed. Additionally, Trump signed an executive order seeking to end birthright citizenship, which means that the children of illegal immigrants are also at risk of deportation. This could face legal challenges as birthright citizenship is currently protected under the 14th Amendment. These orders are especially important for California, as California has many illegal immigrants. Trump also made sweeping changes to environmental policies. His administration announced plans to withdraw the U.S. from the Paris Climate Agreement and the World Health Organization. Additionally, he signed an order aimed at reducing

environmental regulations on oil drilling, aligning with his administration's broader focus on energy independence. Trump issued executive orders targeting diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) programs, including things such as removing spanish versions of government websites. Another executive order declared that the official stance of the U.S. government is that there are only two genders. Additional executive orders included a temporary 75 day suspension of the TikTok ban. Trump also signed an order renaming the Gulf of Mexico to the "Gulf of America." These orders drastically change American policy, and are happening at a much faster rate than most people thought would happen.

<u>Current Events Club – International Spotlight</u> <u>Sudan: Genocide Returns to Darfur</u> By: Keira McKnight

Twenty-two years ago this month, the Darfur region of Sudan was ravaged by genocide within a wider, drawn-out, civil war between dictator Omar al-Bashir's Khartoum government and non-Arab, non-Muslim, and ethnically African groups in the country's south. Carried out by Bashir-sponsored militias known as the Janjaweed, these ethnic Arab militia groups killed more than 400,000 people, mostly ethnic African pastoralists from the Fur, Maasalit, and Zaghawa groups. That Darfur genocide was recognized by the United Nations, the US government, the International Criminal Court, and the African Union in the early 2000s, and the civil war ended in 2005 through the Comprehensive Peace Agreement and the independence of the new nation of South Sudan in 2011.

However, in 2025, genocide, as recognized by the US State Department under the Biden administration, has returned to Darfur and greater Sudan. This time, it is being carried out by the paramilitary rebel group RSF(Rapid Support Forces), which grew out of the earlier Janjaweed. This militia is engaged in a brutal war with the SAF(Sudanese Armed Forces), during which both parties have committed war crimes, crimes against humanity, and other violations of international humanitarian law as reported by a UN Fact-Finding Mission in September of 2024. The evidence for these violations is found in indiscriminate and direct attacks on densely populated civilian areas and infrastructure, mass ethnic killings, intentional obstruction of humanitarian aid, and the use of sexual violence as a weapon of war.

The de facto government of the country, the Sudanese military is currently led by General Abdel Fattah al-Burhan, who rose to power in a 2021 coup d'état by overthrowing the country's transitional government following the 2019 end to the 30-year rule of aforementioned dictator al-Bashir. The rebel RSF is led by Mohamed Hamdan Dagalo, also known as Hemeti, and supported by the UAE in their campaign against the SAF.

As a result of this war, which began in April 2023, Sudan is currently experiencing the largest humanitarian crisis in the world, with 11.3 million people currently displaced from their homes and 25 million people facing acute hunger. Large-scale, 1980s-style famine has already been confirmed in a Darfur displacement camp and is looming in other areas where millions of refugees are sheltered. To avoid this, a ceasefire must be reached between the RSF and the SAF so that aid already allocated can be distributed and new aid can be brought in to alleviate immediate needs.

As of February 11th, the SAF has made major advances in recapturing the capital city Khartoum from the RSF and is poised to control this area. The current downfall of the RSF is likely attributable to stretched supply lines and declining morale, as well as the strengthening of the SAF through its embrace of Islamist militias as allies. While this might seem like an opportunity for the war to end, the RSF continues to hold large portions of territory in Darfur and the surrounding areas as the SAF diversifies its fighting force while complicating its long-term interests. This places both parties in terrible situations for stability and governance in the future, given that the leaders of both groups are largely seen as illegitimate while outside interests of the UAE and Islamist militias harness increasing power over the imploding conflict. The true loser in this situation is, of course, the Sudanese people, who have been failed on every side of the conflict and are in desperate need of recognition and aid in the deadly crossfire of this war.

Many of us in West County have had to deal with these. If you remember the Tubbs and Nuns fires of 2017, the Kincaid fire of 2019, and the Walbridge, Glass, and LNU fires of 2020, as well as heavy rainfall and flooding in recent years, such as in 2022, 2023, 2024, and in February this year,

then you know exactly what I'm talking about. However, rich, corrupt politicians and billionaires, many of whom have unofficially pledged allegiance to Trump, have turned a blind eye or have just straight up denied what is happening. Why? Because these people want money, and they don't want to be regulated. This means that in the future, we will see bigger and more destructive and wildfires, floods, more temperatures/season lengths. And when it happens, little to nothing will be done to help the victims of this tragedy, while the insurance companies pocket the money they didn't spend helping these people.

Immigration: America is a country of immigrants,

Well, Donald Trump doesn't think so. However, immigrants, legal and undocumented, pay their taxes and contribute massive amounts of money to the U.S. economy, being a pillar of what makes us a global superpower. These immigrants are the backbone of the economy at all levels—they are our maids, cooks, chefs, Uber drivers, fast food workers, cashiers, janitors, nurses, waiters, and more. They help make Americs run.

And yet, Obama deported more immigrants than any other president, becoming known as the "Deporter-in-Chief." During Trump's first term, he ran on a promise to "Build the Wall," referring to a wall on the southern border. As his term went on and the wall's construction stalled, he began shifting to the deportation of existing migrants. ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement), at the behest of the White House, began raiding communities from coast to coast and deported thousands of people, separating families and violating their Constitutional and human rights.

And with the return of Donald Trump, many feel like things are guaranteed to change for the worse. Many people at Analy know someone who is an immigrant: a friend, a relative, etc. These people will have to live in constant fear for the next four years now that an openly xenophobic president, a person who said immigrants "poison the blood of our country" and pushed the false pet-eating narrative of Haitian immigrants, a person with a horrifyingly ultranationalist stance on the border, is running the country once again. These people are just as American as the rest of us, and yet they suffer the brunt of this violent rhetoric. First- and second-generation immigrants at Analy have to worry about ICE raids wherever they go, and many now no longer feel safe and have to deal with racist comments because of this.

The Economy: After the pandemic, there was a big inflation spike. If any of you remember the 2022 recession, you know what I'm talking about. During the Biden administration, the media and Donald Trump made the economy seem worse than it was. In reality, inflation fell to around 3 percent, and unemployment also fell as job creation rose.

However, it wasn't all sunshine and rainbows. Many voters said they voted for Trump purely for economic change, and they were somewhat right. They believed one of the biggest misconceptions about the economy: that less inflation means lower prices. In reality, it means prices just go up less quickly. But if eggs are still \$5, people are not going to be convinced by a couple of statistics from a government agency.

This is the problem: Donald Trump is not an economist, just like he wasn't a politician until 2015. He is a TV star. One of his most

infamous executive orders recently was to raise 25% tariffs on Mexico and Canada and 10% tariffs on China. These countries are our biggest trading partners, and Canada and Mexico are some of our closest allies neighboring countries. All three countries were vocal in their opposition, with Canada and Mexico immediately raising retaliatory tariffs. Even though the tariffs have been delayed, it shows how Trump is willing to use money as a weapon, even at the expense of the average person, including Trump voters.

He has also been on a cost-cutting crusade, with the help of billionaires, mainly Elon Musk. With DOGE (Department of Government Efficiency), he has supposedly been cutting costs, however, the agencies targeted appear to be politically motivated. For instance, he notoriously terminated USAID, which provided aid for developing countries to fight war, disease, famine, poverty, and similar crises. He has also attacked agencies like the FAA (Federal Aviation Administration). Ironically, Elon Musk recently said that he will not be able to cut costs a lot since the rest of the money will go to the military and essential programs like Social Security. And he is the richest man alive currently.

If Donald Trump has his way, tariffs will be enacted on whoever disagrees with him, so a lot of countries could be tariffed. However, they could also impose retaliatory tariffs. So, if you buy stuff like coffee, which is not mass-produced in the US, be prepared to see even higher costs because it's going to be a struggle to sustain ourselves if we have to produce our goods with little to no imports.

DEI was one of the things that Donald Trump loathed the most. It has been called communist, Marxist, racist, socialist, radical, un-American—every name in the book. In reality, it does not work like that at all.

DEI: DEI stands for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion and its main purpose is to even out the racial hierarchy and disparities stemming from slavery, Jim Crow, police brutality, the income gap, and systemic racism and its legacy in general. This can be done with financial compensation, public apologies, quotas, laws and bills, court rulings, and many more methods. However, it has come under fire in recent years by conservatives, especially Donald Trump. As a result, many DEI programs are being overturned, and as a result, areas that were historically dominated by white people, like higher-ranking corporate positions are once again becoming strongholds for white people.

We cannot talk about DEI without talking about women's rights and the ERA. In the 1800s and early 1900s, women fought tooth and nail for suffrage, that is, the right to vote, and they were instrumental in many laws of the Progressive Era being passed. Women of color were also at the forefront of civil rights movements for Mexican farmworkers in California, Black people in the South, and more. Beginning in the 1960s, the women's liberation movement kicked off, which rejected the life of a housewife and mother in favor of a career woman who could do it all, a defining characteristic of the Boomer generation. However, the pay gap between men and women did not vanish. And the ERA (Equal Rights Amendment) came three states short of passing in 1979 and 1982. The ERA would bar gender-based discrimination, and three states passed it after the deadline, so if not for the deadline, the amendment would become law.

Foreign Policy: Trump has pursued a disastrous



foreign policy; there's no other way to put it. He has praised autocratic, dictatorial strongmen like Viktor Orban, Vladimir Putin, and Kim Jong-Un while demeaning long-standing allies. Donald Trump has used tariffs to threaten countries like Colombia, which didn't accept the plane carrying deportees until Trump threatened 50 percent tariffs.

One of the most controversial foreign policies he has had is to aggressively support Israel's president, Benjamin Netanyahu, and his ethnic cleansing of Palestinians by proposing that the Gaza Strip be turned into a US territory. By doing this, he risks alienating his more moderate and conservative Arab allies. He has also said that he will find a solution to the Ukraine war, but his ideas involve Ukraine surrendering all conquered territories, which is not popular in either America or Europe and especially not Ukraine.

And then there's his expansionism. He has insisted on taking Greenland from Denmark, with force if necessary, and renaming it to—I kid you not, Red White and Blueland. This has been the highlight of his foreign policy so far. He has also demanded that Panama give him the Panama Canal, and he has wanted to annex Canada for some time now.

For the average person, though, the main foreign policy of Trump that will impact people is tariffs. Many goods, from coffee to SHEIN, are imported or cannot be easily or safely produced in the United States. As a result, Trump's economic belligerence will result in steep price hikes.

In conclusion, Donald Trump has issued many executive orders resembling diktats. These have had mixed reactions and results, but while many people are very vocal in their opposition, they either don't have the power to do anything, or they don't take action. We have yet to see the long-term consequences of these policies. Only time will tell. Part 2 is coming soon...

Springtime Recipes

Pasta Primavera: Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Prepare 10 oz of penne pasta according to the package instructions, cooking until al dente. Drain and toss with a drizzle of olive oil to prevent

sticking. Heat 2 tbsp of olive oil in a large, deep pan over medium heat. Add 4 sliced garlic cloves, 1 yellow squash, 1 zucchini, 1 bunch of asparagus, 1 cup of cherry tomatoes, 1 cup of thinley sliced onion, 1 tsp salt, and several grinds of pepper and sauté for 3 to 4 minutes, or until the vegetables are tender. Add the pasta, ½ cup frozen peas, ¾ cup grated pecorino cheese, a squeeze of lemon juice, and a pinch of red pepper flakes and toss to combine. Stir the chopped basil and tarragon if wanted. Season to taste, garnish with more basil,

Carrot Cake Cupcakes: Whisk together 1 ¼ cups flour, ½ cup granulated sugar, ½ cup light brown sugar, ½ tsp baking powder, ¼ tsp baking soda, ½ tsp salt, 1 tsp cinnamon and ¼ tsp nutmeg. Stir in 34 cup oil of your choosing (vegetable, avocado, canola oil). Add 2 large eggs, one at a time, pausing to scrape down sides of the bowl after each addition. Stir in 1 ½ tsp of vanilla extract and 2 tbsp milk. Add 1 ½ cups of grated carrots and ½ cups of chopped walnuts or pecans (optional), and stir until combined. Evenly divide batter into cupcake liners, filling each about of the way full. Transfer to oven and bake on 350F for 20 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean or with moist crumbs. Allow to cool in the baking tin for 5 minutes before carefully removing to a cooling rack to cool completely before decorating with cream cheese frosting.

Strawberry Lemonade: Use a blender or food processor to puree the 1 ½ cups of destemmed strawberries. Strain them through a fine mesh sieve to remove seeds if desired. In a small saucepan, over medium heat, stir together 1 ½ cups of sugar and 2 cups water. Bring to a boil, and stir until sugar is dissolved. Remove from heat and allow to cool to room temperature. Strain 1 ½ cups of freshly squeezed lemon juice through a fine-mesh sieve into a 2-quart pitcher. Add in the sugar water mixture and pureed strawberries. Stir to combine. Refrigerate until cold. When ready to serve, add 2 ½ cups of cold water and stir. Taste, and add more water if it's too sweet. Then it's ready to be served. Ice is recommended!

Horchata Recipe By: Diana Lazaro

Now that spring is coming near, it's time for everyone to find an opportunity to grow. There are many ways to do this, for example learning a new recipe. Agua de Horchata is a refreshing beverage that can be enjoyed throughout the year, not just spring and it's easy to make. This sweet milk drink originated from Spain and was brought to the Americas when the Europeans arrived here, which is why Horchata remains popular throughout Latin America. Though there are many variations of Horchata, this recipe is the way I like to make it.

For ingredients, you'll need milk of your choice, uncooked long grain rice, vanilla extract, a cinnamon stick, condensed milk, evaporated milk, and sugar of your choice. For kitchen items you'll need a blender, strainer, measuring cups, a medium sized bowl, a pitcher, and a large spoon.

First, you need to add 1 1/2 cups of the uncooked rice to your bowl. Then you will pour 4 cups of water into the same bowl, add the large cinnamon stick, and let it sit for about 5 hours. After it has sat for 5 hours pour all contents of the bowl inside your blender and blend until smooth. Next, you're going to want to strain this liquid into the pitcher to remove any clumps. Then you add the can of evaporated and condensed milk. Once this is done add 6 cups of the milk of your choice. At that point, add 2 tablespoons of vanilla extract and ½ cup of sugar, then mix. Finally, you can add ice and enjoy your delicious Horchata.




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
